



DIRECTOR'S NOTE:

I am so happy to be returning this year to Theatre Jacksonville. Last year I directed *The Sweet Delilah Swim Club*, and now I am excited to help create a very different experience for you. *Last Train to Nibroc* is a deceptively simple play. The play is carried on the backs of only two characters equally. These characters are the antithesis of two dimensional, so in this sense, it is also the plight and joy of a true studied performer especially one that might have perhaps dabbled indifferent straight acting techniques.

The characters need to also display not only a character arch but also a believable affection for each other. I have watched this small cast become friends and laugh and support each other. This is not only a play about love of another but also self-love, a personal challenge of mine up until not so long ago. It's a universal theme we all can relate to. These simple ideas are some of the most difficult for all of us to accept- that we deserve to be loved and there is nothing wrong with us.

I worked with Kelsey last when I directed Figaro here a few years ago and prior to that about 12 years earlier when I directed her in Edith Stein—she was in high school. I was her theatre teacher at Bishop Kenny. She is a gem, and I am tickled that I was able to direct her again now as the awesome grownup she has become. Alec has been nothing but a song that keeps getting better and better. He is not only professional but one of the most genuine people I have met, and I am elated to work with him for the first time (hopefully not the last). I am working with Natalie a second time, and as she is an actress and sometimes stage manager. it is almost like there is an assistant director baked in there as well. Her opinion is invaluable, and her company is king. As far as all the others here at this theatre—vou know who you are-Thank you from the bottom of my heart for the continued opportunity of self-expression and a place to be authentically myself.

ABOUT NATHANAEL WEST AND F. SCOTT FITZGERALD



F. Scott Fitzgerald

With backgrounds intermingling in France and New York during an era of literary renaissance, Nathanael West and F. Scott Fitzgerald were authors who criticized the wealthy and frivolous upper class with prose of satire depicting them as human and common as their working-class counterparts. West, (born October 17, 1903) was a Jewish immigrant who graduated from Brown University (1924) and wrote his first novel "The Dream Life of Balso Snell" during a 15-month stay in Paris and then his critically acclaimed "The Day of the Locust" in 1939. West gained recognition throughout France in World War II from French translations of his books. He and his wife tragically passed in an automobile accident on December 22nd, 1940.

Coincidentally, F. Scott Fitzgerald (born September 24, 1896) died of a heart attack a day before, December 21st, 1940. Fitzgerald gained more popularity throughout the states after an adventure in France inspired him to write the world-renowned classic, "The Great Gatsby". Fitzgerald dropped out of Princeton and joined the Army during World War I, which is how he met the love of his life, Zelda Sayre, in Alabama. To try and escape the life of fortune and fame that he so thoroughly, and ironically, romanticized in his works, F. Scott Fitzgerald and his wife settled on the French Riviera where Zelda took up ballet and practiced endlessly to the point of a mental breakdown in 1930 from which she never recovered.

Which leads us to our story, Last Train to Nibroc. Raleigh and May are riding a train with the coffins of both authors returning home to be buried. Both suffered a period of war and the struggle of pursuing dreams, watching the division of social and economic classes become deeper. But they also enjoyed a time of prosperity and growth never seen before, historically, which will be mirrored in the events that will unfold on stage. As the sun rises on Raleigh and May, they are going to challenge each other to their depths and discover love in unsuspecting moments.
